Introduction and Background:

The Scriptures are the authoritative measuring rod of the people of God. In the Scriptures, the people of God can use them to draw out multiple applications for faith and practice. Interpreting and applying the Scriptures as the source of how one is to live in the presence of God is both challenging and rewarding. The primary meaning of the Scriptures, however, appear to be their revealing the nature and character of God. The Scriptures are the particular or special revelation of God that give detailed and purposed understanding to who God is and how He acts. Though written over a thousand years with more than 40 authors, the scriptures of the old and new covenants progressively illuminate God's person and purpose in this world and the world to come.
